

Childcare

- What do other districts do?
 - Warrenton: Free"Care Days" on non-PLC Mondays
 - Partner with community resources, staffed by district paras, organized by district summer school/care days administrator; dental cleanings, medical checkups, mental health, safety, hygiene.
 - Fee for before and after school care on "Care Days"
 - No "Care Day" on PLC Days
 - Montgomery County:
 - 2 churches offered free care on Mondays
 - 8 children combined attended
 - Cancelled after first year
 - No concerns since then



Childcare

- Continued: What do other districts do?
 - o East Newton:
 - Small group of concerned citizens before implementation
 - District offered childcare for a fee
 - Zero families enrolled
 - No church implemented programs
 - North Callaway:
 - 4 groups consisting of daycares and churches offered program
 - 1 student signed up
 - Community:
 - Specialist did a needs analysis before the switch, in prep to open a business. No need found.
 - 2 churches committed to start programs. No students enrolled.
 - Gather list of high school students willing to watch. None were used.



Childcare

- 11 Licensed Providers in Hallsville
 - 3 currently take no school aged children
 - 4 can take on an additional 2-3 students on Monday
 - 1 can take on an additional 8-10 students on Monday and possibly more if the need arises
 - 2 inquiries with in past few months into starting before and after school licensed programs
- Churches
 - Continuing to reach out to find about the availability of starting a day program
- Hallsville High School Students
 - Provide list of parents based on HHS students who would be interested
- What about using the school to provide a program?



Food Insecurity

Warrenton

- Buddy packs expanded.
- K-12 students may come in for food on Monday; increased district expense

Montgomery County

- Ministerial alliance provided backpacks and has increased donation to cover third day.
- Application for program to provide after school meals starting in January (depends on 50% FRL)

East Newton

- Already had volunteer group funding backpack program
- Sending 180 weekly.
- Volunteers raised extra \$6,000 per year to fund food for third day.

North Callaway

- Local churches provided extra food for buddy backpacks
- High School created food pantry

Community

Donations from local businesses to the food bank. Expanded to meet the need.



Food Insecurity

- How are our current student needs currently being addressed?
 - K-5 Buddy Packs
 - 50 students at Primary
 - 76 students at Intermediate
 - Still waiting on total number of families served
 - 6th-12th Grade Buddy Packs
 - If a student needs one, they go to the school counselor
 - 6th grade has not had anyone utilize for several years
 - HHS had 1 student for a few weeks last year



Food Insecurity

- Concern regardless of calendar selected
 - Would like to see the district connect families with resources through the counseling offices
- Food on the additional 11 or 13 days of school if moving to a four-day week
 - Secure additional funding for Buddy Packs
 - Around \$500-600 per additional day
 - Fundraising could be a possibility
 - Would like to see if the district could sponsor the additional cost



Athletics & Activities

Participation

Warrenton, Montgomery County, East Newton, Harrisburg, Community, and North Callaway:
 No decrease in participation

Practices

- Warrenton: No MS practice on Mondays, HS during the day
- Montgomery County: Practices during the day
- o East Newton: Practices after 3:00 p.m.
- North Callaway: Practice optional with no impact on playing time
- Harrisburg: HS anytime, MS after 5:00 p.m.
- Community: MS practices initially restricted to evening, however, now held any time because transportation has not been an issue

Currently

- Student's responsibility to ensure they have made arrangements with teachers for classes missed
- o RTI/8th Hour continue to be at end of day

Recommendation

Possibility to hold HS practices during the day, MS practices after 5:00

Warrenton

- More students achieving at grade level compared with last year
- Increased time for literacy interventions
- Consistent schedule has had a positive impact on students
- No observed negative impact on students
- Teachers are tired at end of day
- Student and staff attendance is flat this year.

Montgomery County

- College-bound/AP students very appreciative of Monday time for studying and completing papers/projects.
- Many other students working/interning and securing employment for after graduation.
- Career center numbers have increased, even with attendance the fifth day
- Students and staff attendance both improved slightly
- Savings on substitutes



East Newton

- No change in student academic performance
- Mondays have a high positive impact on weekly stamina for students and staff
- Student attendance up 1% this year
- Staff attendance improved with scheduling of appointments on Monday

North Callaway

- MAP scores have seen an increase
- DESE growth metrics at Exceeding
- Big decline observed in non-instructional activities (e.g., reward parties, movies, extra recesses).
- Student attendance has increased, especially at higher-FRL building
- No observed change in staff attendance

Community R-VI

- Teacher and Student attendance improved, including FRL students
- Academics has increased, but district does not attribute to four-day



A+ Program

- Students would still have enough volunteer hours
 - Students need to complete 50 hours of tutoring (160 hours possible in a 4 day week semester)

Flex Students

- Currently have 26 students
- Monday would allow students to work and earn hours that they otherwise may not be able to get.

MATC Students

- Tuesday-Friday: Bus traveling to MATC leaves at 6:55 a.m.
- Monday: MATC on delayed start, those students can take bus to school
- Transportation is already a part of the agreement with students and parents when enrolling in classes
- MATC students are currently expected to attend MATC when Hallsville is not in session provided Moberly is.

Data Tracking

- MAP & EOC results
- o DRA, SRI, STAR, reading levels
- Will continue to track regardless of calendar adopted
- High School is implementing homework tracking in order to improve turn in rate. This will be tracked with either calendar adopted.

Homework

- Concerns about increasing homework were mentioned
 - Each building would need to address those concerns if a 4 day week calendar is adopted.



GATE

- Serves 3-12 students
- K-2 Enrichment
- Enough hours in the day to service students in a four-day week
- Concern over scheduling for next year
 - 2nd grade to Primary
 - Avoiding specials and recess
 - Time spent transporting students to MS & avoiding passing periods in MS
 - Avoiding too long of classes
 - Yearly challenge for scheduling because of schedule changes.

ECSE Preschool

- Currently attend 4 days a week (Tuesday-Friday, 720 minutes weekly)
- Monday currently being used for IEPs and teacher plan
- Four Day School Week Calendars
 - Still attend Tuesday-Friday with 720 minutes weekly
 - AM time stays the same, PM class gets pushed back to ride bus home
 - Add plan time into day between classes



Special Education

- We have 146 students on IEPs preschool through 12th grade.
- 48 students have speech (only) IEPs
- 98 are eligible in a special education category other than speech (only) and receive support with academic skills, social/emotional skills, language skills, adaptive skills, motor skills, vision and hearing.
- Approximately 6 students leave for therapy and/or counseling services (outside services) during one or more school days.

Special Education & Academics

- Retention of information was addressed as a concern, but it has been found that the students often had difficulty focusing on the fifth day of school anyway and that the change actually improved focus and attention.
- Although we have not had regression of academic loss, we have had some behavioral regression, if the house is not as structured as the student needs it to be.

Special Education & Benefits

- There has been an increase in productivity in the classroom
- Increased student and staff attendance.
- Increase in quality of staff selection, individuals are willing to make a drive four days a week

Special Education & Concerns

- 60 calendar days to complete an evaluation
- Losing Monday for testing
 - School actually stated this as a positive change.
 - While they did lose a couple of days to test, the teachers had Mondays to write thorough evaluation reports, which they previously did not between teaching, testing, and writing the evaluations.



Do SPED minutes have to be done/written differently going to a 4 day week?

- In special education, we look at student percentage of time pulled out or pushed into the classroom instead of minutes per day.
- With the four-day calendars, the consistency the calendar has would allow the percentage of minutes to be more accurately served each week.
- When looking at total student contact days, the four-day school week calendars would result in 11 to 13 of lost instructional days.

Do SPED services (occupational, speech, etc.) have to be done differently going to a 4 day week?

 Our therapists do not see the kids daily. OT and PT work in other districts and would adjust the days they are needed in our district.

Staff Recruitment & Retention

Warrenton

- Best teacher retention in 5 years, one of the best in the last 16 years
- Previously had 20% turnover
- Bus driver: Modest raise
- o Paras: No increase

Montgomery City

- No one works on Mondays except for one part-time custodian
- Increase in applicants since implementation in 2011, a few applicants state the four-day week
- Lower turnover
- Highered two quality math teachers in one year
- Teachers able to spend weekend with family; use Monday for planning



Staff Recruitment & Retention

East Newton

- o Competing with suburban SW MO districts where salaries are \$6,000 higher
- Since four-day implementation, they have been able to recruit veteran teachers from higher-paying districts

North Callaway

- Applicant pool has increased across all staff classifications
- All positions currently filled
- Still have 20% turnover

Community R-VI

- Recent math opening had 5-6 applications, compared to 1-2 before switch
- Similar results for science
- All positions currently filled, including hourly and drivers
- Turnovers attributed to spouse moves or moving back home



Additional Questions

Juvenile Crime

 At least four other school districts have not seen an increase in juvenile crime, the other it was not mentioned in conversation.

Home Values

- No change in sale home prices observed in districts questioned
- One school district the realtors are advertising as a family-friendly community due to four-day calendar
